

A message from the National Chairman

Welcome to this edition of LIFE News!

Let's start with good things. We rejoice in the way the Housing team and supporters are keeping afloat our six houses which no longer have Supporting People money. We rejoice in the growing success of the LIFE shops programme, the revival of many LIFE groups and the continuing achievements of LIFE Education. We rejoice in the fact that, though we are far from really flush, our overall financial position is much more secure than it was 18 months ago. Much of this is reported in detail elsewhere in these pages.

But very importantly, there have been major stirrings on the political front. Last December, Health minister Anne Milton told the House of Commons that reducing the amount of abortion was 'an absolute

priority' and conceded the need

to provide independent pre-abortion counselling for women . We still await a Consultation Paper, promised for the end of June, which would allow public discussion about it.

The proposal put the wind up the abortion industry, which has suffered two more severe shocks. First came reports of growing numbers of British women having two, three or more abortions and of sex-selection abortion being practised in some British clinics. Then the Care Quality Commission, a national watchdog charged with overseeing healthcare, launched a nationwide inspection of abortion-providers and found a shocking amount of non-compliance with the law – such as pre-signing of the authorisation forms.

For those who have believed that the Abortion Act was not always intended to open the floodgates, the law is being flouted blatantly. So, with even the BMA issuing a statement (on 27 June) calling for independent pre-abortion counselling, it is difficult to see how Parliament will not soon have to look at what is happening on account of – or despite – the 1967 Act.

There is a twist to all this: both the Royal College of Obstetricians and Gynaecologists and the Royal College of Psychiatrists now make the following claim, namely, that it does not matter whether a woman 'terminates' an unwanted pregnancy or goes to term – the effect on her mental health is the same. The psychiatrists add that abortion can sometimes prove more damaging than continuing the pregnancy (if the woman is pressured into it, has 'negative' feelings about it, etc).

We are being told that continuing a pregnancy will carry either the same risk to the woman's mental health as having an abortion or a lesser one. But 98% of abortions are done on the statutory ground that 'continuance of the pregnancy involves a risk, greater than if the pregnancy were terminated, to the mental health of the woman.' Greater – not the same or less!

Parliament will have to acknowledge that the vast majority of abortions are not protected by the 1967 Act and are offences. That is what the experts are (unwittingly) telling us. In the meantime, in view of what the Royal Colleges are saying, how can abortion doctors continue to carry out abortions on mental health grounds?

LIFE Fertility *Care* gave us the confidence to try again

Meet Emilia, born 23 May, a week early, weighing 5lb 14oz. Mum Marsha Towey says: "I'd had two miscarriages but the NHS won't do anything until you've had three. I was too nervous to try again without knowing why I was miscarrying; losing a baby is such an awful thing to go through.

"I found out about the LIFE FertilityCare (LFC) programme through a friend whose sister had suffered three miscarriages but then gone on to start a family after treatment with LFC. Me and my husband Paul checked out the website and loved the fact that it works with your body, restores health and helps you to understand your cycle.

"We weren't keen to conceive without knowing

what was going wrong. And the cost of LFC was very reasonable which was an important factor for us.

"The LFC physician, Dr Anne Carus, helped me to maximise my cycle and hormone levels, using cutting edge research which is not currently used within the NHS. I felt that she worked with me, explaining every stage of the process clearly. I was carefully monitored throughout my pregnancy and guided by the LFC team.

"Now we have Emilia we are elated and feel so lucky that we found LIFE and that we didn't give up."

Life issues in focus

LIFE has never been far from the action during the last year. In the summer and autumn of 2011 we found ourselves facing negative press coverage, yet continued to support the right of women to be offered independent preabortion counselling. Government consultations on abortion advertising and sex education in schools made us determined to resist the normalisation of abortion and the removal of parents' rights in sex education. And 2012 has, so far, brought with it some extraordinary developments:

- The Falconer Commission a supposedly independent body that in fact consisted largely of supporters of euthanasia published its report, a transparent attempt to advance a particular agenda. Fortunately most of the media, and many politicians, saw the Falconer Commission for what it was, and the report appears to have died a death, for now.
- In February, a paper advocating infanticide highlighted many of the cruelties and inconsistencies of the pro-abortion position, for there are very few arguments for abortion that are not also, in the final analysis, arguments for infanticide.
- February also saw the first of two big scandals involving abortion clinics, when the *Daily Telegraph* revealed that a number of abortion clinics were offering illegal sex-selective abortions.
- The following month much more serious allegations came to light following inspections of abortion clinics by the Care Quality Commission. This time it was suggested, on good evidence, that many clinics were failing to provide women with appropriate

counselling and support, and were using pre-signed forms to get round the Abortion Act's requirement for two doctors' signatures.

- Two opinion polls also highlighted the uneasiness of the British public with our current system of de facto abortion on demand. In January, a poll revealed that half of all women thought the abortion law was too permissive.
- revealed that six out of ten women supported a reduction in the time limit; over half of respondents thought that taxpayers' money should not be used to fund abortions except in emergencies; two thirds felt that women were not being given enough information about alternatives to abortion; and almost 50% felt that abortion should not be made available to under-18s without parental consent.
- Latest abortion stats showed an increase in teenagers having repeat abortions. For one in seven teenagers having an abortion in 2010, it was not their first. Clearly, many are using abortion as a form of contraception, with, for example, 57 teenagers having an abortion for the fourth time and a shocking 485 for the third time
- In an attempt to tackle teenage pregnancy rates, an NHS report recommended that girls as young

- as 13 should be given the Pill via pharmacies, without seeing their doctor. But leading experts claim it will exacerbate the problem, making teenagers more likely to have sex.
- A paper in the *British Journal* of *Obstetrics and Gynaecology* highlighted what may be a serious problem in the compilation of late-term abortion statistics in England and Wales. The authors compared published data on late-term abortion with the data from the EPICure2 longitudinal study and found "substantial under-reporting" of late abortion in the official statistics.
- Evidence mounted concerning birth defects and IVF, with a study claiming that babies conceived through ICSI, a particular IVF technique, are twice as likely to suffer defects as babies conceived naturally.
- And on top of this shocking data, evidence continued to emerge that abortion can be extremely damaging to women's psychological and emotional health and wellbeing.

Whatever the issue – from rising STI infections to high abortion rates and the continuing attempts to liberalise the abortion law – LIFE's role in the public arena, defending life and the real dignity of individuals, continues to be an irreplaceable one.

"LIFE's a fantastic cause - there's nothing like it."

At 22, Sammy Morgan (pictured right) is the youngest of the LIFE shop managers. Full of life and very creative, she has great organisational and managerial skills. Eireann Janssens, LIFE's Retail Development & Operations Manager, met up with her in Hereford to see how she was getting on

Why have you chosen to work in charity retail?

When you work for a charity you know you are giving something back. But also, no two days are ever the same. I meet all sorts of people and my team feel more like a family. Every morning I look forward to going to work.

How long have you worked in charity shops?

I started volunteering for Barnardo's several years ago and was then promoted to Assistant Manager. I haven't looked back!

How do you like working for LIFE?

I hadn't heard of LIFE before I applied for the job. Now I think it's a fantastic cause and that there's nothing like it. In Hereford, we have a Care service which is attached to the shop. I think other charity shops are thinking of offering services in their shops - it's something maybe LIFE has thought of first!

Describe an average day in the shop.

There are times when it's full on: people come in with their donations and they



need sorting out immediately. Sometimes people want something unusual like a fancy dress item and that means searching for them. At other times, it's quieter and this is when I make sure the shop is tidy.


What is your biggest challenge?

Without a doubt it is the tight space. The shop is really well-located in Hereford's town centre but the downside is the storage space. We have to sort bags of donations the same day and store them in the loft.

Lastly, what makes a good charity shop?

To start with – a pleasant smell! I think we have all

walked into charity shops which reek of musty old clothes and that is a huge turn-off. But above all, a good charity shop is one which has good stock, presented well; you can charge more for goods which are attractively presented. Lastly, I think having a regular turnover of goods is important - in Hereford we change all of the stock every two weeks to encourage people to come in regularly. Customers will come into the shop more often if they think they will be seeing new stuff.


"We were shown around the LIFE house and saw how much a donation of toddler clothes meant to the mother of a little boy who had only the clothes on his back," explains Andy.

Georgina's Story "I learnt to be independent."

I was 17 when I moved into the LIFE house with my 9-month-old son, Michael.

My relationship with Michael's father had broken down and I had to move back to my Mum's. But Mum's three-bedroomed house was overcrowded with me, my two sisters, two brothers and Mum, so I had to leave Michael in the care of his Dad

When I was referred to the LIFE house in Bracknell I was relieved to be back with Michael but nervous as I wasn't sure what to expect. I needn't have been - I settled in well to the LIFE house. Mum would come and visit every week and we met on other days, too.

The Support Workers at the house helped me to sort out my Housing Benefit and Income Support Claims, as well as Child Benefit as Michael's Dad had had to claim that while he'd been looking after him.

There were Life Skills sessions at the house covering topics like money management, household skills and childcare. These were really useful and the shopping vouchers I collected for attending meant I could treat Michael.

I realised pretty much straight away that it was important to keep up with the rent and the staff advised me to buy some small things for my flat for when I moved out, which I did.

Unfortunately, Mum suddenly passed away in July last year after a short illness. It was such a shock to us all. As I was the oldest child, I arranged the funeral as my Mum would have wanted. We all miss her very much, but I know she would be very proud of all of us and is with us all the time. Michael looks up and tells us that Nanny is in the sky.

In February, I was offered a two-bedroomed flat. We were ready to move on from the LIFE house as I had learnt to be independent and had a good idea of what life would be like. Living in the LIFE house is like an in-between stage; I had my independence but help from staff when I needed it and other girls to talk to if I wanted.

Things are going well and me and Michael are really happy. I

still have things to get for my flat but I have made it into a nice home for

my flat but I have made it into a nice home for Michael - and for when my brothers and sisters come to visit.

Why LIFE Education?

If we are to build a pro-life culture then it is hearts and minds we need to reach. LIFE's Care service looks after the present; Education is our hope for the future. It's about vision and sowing seeds for future generations.

The LIFE Education service provides talks in schools, colleges and universities across the UK, discussing a wide range of 'life' issues. Here, two LIFE Education Officers tell us about the LIFE school talks which always have an immediate and important impact on young people.

The Relationships Talk

Michaela Aston



It's a joy to see the dramatic effect this session can have on the students in front of me. It enables them to see the world through a different lens and many are relieved to be offered more life-affirming ways of living.

By exploring the pressures of the media and culture, students come to see how sex is being sold to them as safe and fun with no consequences, and they come to recognise how this greatly influences the choices they make. When I ask them to focus on what it is they really want, now and in their future, they always say that it is to love and be loved - not used, which they say is all that is on offer.

We discuss the real consequences of sexual activity – pregnancy, abortion, STIs, emotional hurt and feelings of being used. Many come to value themselves as individuals who matter and who are worthy of love



and respect. Often, girls come up afterwards and say things like: "Thank you. I now have a reason to say no." and: "Why didn't someone tell us this stuff before?"

One of the most exciting things I've been doing recently has been providing speaker training to university students, equipping them to form new pro-life societies around the country. Since the first training weekend last June in Oxford (with

another coming soon) a strong new network of student pro-life societies has developed; these young people are key to our pro-life future.

I always promote the unique services that LIFE offers – our Care and Housing service coping with the results of crisis pregnancies and abortions - and I am proud of what Education is doing to help reduce the number of these pregnancies happening in the first place.

The Abortion Talk

LIFE Education speaks to a wide variety of students from a mixture of backgrounds but it is the Abortion talk which is requested most often. Tailored thoughtfully to ensure we speak to them on their level, all our talks encourage questioning and stimulate debate. With abortion affecting one in three women before the age of 40, we are always sensitive to the fact we may be talking to students who are personally affected.

Often we are approached following a talk by a student who is struggling with something that's affecting them in some way. One girl in particular sticks in my mind: I was telling a story a counsellor had shared with me and an incredibly brave girl stood up in said: "That's exactly how I feel, I had an abortion two weeks ago." Thankfully, I was able to put her in contact with our counselling service.

Outside London, the North West - with over 24,000 abortions last year - has the highest abortion rates in the UK.

LIFE's Education work is vital in this area. Many students will never have heard the pro-life perspective before and will have subliminally accepted the abortion argument fed through the media.

Boys often feel excluded from the debate, seeing abortion as a 'woman's right to choose' and yet they too can talk recently, a 16-year-old boy told me that his former girlfriend had an abortion without telling him. He was shocked when he found himself crying

We encourage students to think for themselves, question everything (including us) and make an informed opinion. Every single talk we give has a positive effect – some become instantly pro-life and others seriously question their current thinking. At the pro-lifers are reasonable, nice people! Often, all that is needed for a shift in position is the truth. The facts speak for themselves.







Return to Kyrgyzstan

LIFE Education Officer Mark Bhagwandin returned to Kyrgyzstan in April, a year after his first visit.

"I was invited by Family Harmony, an organisation which promotes the value of long-term relationships, to deliver LIFE's Relationship talk to almost 500 students aged 15-17. Judging by the evaluation sheets gathered afterwards, it was a hugely worthwhile trip, with one student commenting: "I have changed my attitude to sex and relationships."

Understanding pregnancy loss

Attended by around 50 delegates, the Walsall and Wolverhampton LIFE groups organised a seminar on 11 May exploring some of the issues around pregnancy loss. Walsall LIFE's Liz Lloyd, explains: "We welcomed a range of health and social care professionals as well as volunteers working in LIFE Care Centres around the UK."

Speakers included Elly Petrucci from the LIFE Education team discussing 'What is Pregnancy Loss?'; Dr Pravin Thevathasan on 'Abortion and Mental Health: some recent developments'; Ira Winter on LIFE FertilityCare and Ruth Kirchmeier from the Miscarriage Association.

"After lunch, Lisa Brayshaw from the Still Birth and Neonatal Death Society (SANDS) talked about the help her organisation offers as well as sharing her own personal experience of loss," continues Liz. "And finally Elly Petrucci presented information about post-abortion counselling.

"Our evaluation forms showed the day had been an extremely useful one for participants, who said they had gained a better understanding of what their clients may experience following pregnancy loss and of the help available to support them."

Naomi still keeps in touch with us and buys lots of clothes from the Derby LIFE charity shop. She has nothing but praise for the help she was given during her pregnancy and continues to receive support from us."

Ireland's Gain

Last December London-based PAPRI (Pension and Population Research Institute) published an exceptionally interesting report: one which poses a challenge to those responsible for our health policies and our legislators - to which they have not replied.

Entitled Ireland's Gain, it analyses the ways in which Ireland's women are significantly healthier than those in the rest of the British Isles and elsewhere. and speculates on what might happen to Irish society if it 'liberalised' its laws on induced abortion.

It reports the following striking statistics about the Irish Republic:

- it has a much healthier demographic profile than many other countries, with birth rates close to replacement level, 21% of its population under 15 (compared with 17.4% in the UK, 13.3% in Germany and 13.1% in Japan) and only 11.6% aged 65+ (against 16.5% in the UK, 20.6% in Germany and 22.9% in Japan)
- it, like Northern Ireland, has much lower stillbirth, low birth-weight and pre-term birth rates than do England & Wales, let alone Scotland
- it has the lowest maternal death rate in the British Isles
- it has lower female breast cancer rates than do England & Wales or Scotland (191.1 per 100,000 women aged 50-54 in 2009, for instance, compared with 274.2 in England & Wales and 282.2 in Scotland)

• there is some evidence that Irish women - in the North and the Republic - have fewer mental health problems, use fewer anti-depressants and suffer fewer diseases of the immune system (but all this requires further research)

How to explain these statistics? Clearly there may be many factors at work. We must not over-simplify. But is there not one obvious one? Irish women have fewer abortions than do English, Scottish, German and Japanese ones; and induced abortion is a known risk factor for such things as subsequent premature delivery, breast cancer and depression - let alone for wreaking demographic havoc.

There are strong forces at work in Ireland to embrace abortionism. But the Irish people should remember what their land has gained in the past from refusing to do so; and ours should face up to what our society has lost.

So far, alas, England's medical establishment has either pooh-poohed PAPRI's work or conveniently ignored it.
