Policy Statement

To ensure Life is fully committed to safeguarding and promoting the welfare of individuals with whom we meet in regard to Radicalisation, Extremism and Gang culture.

<u>Aims</u>

Our aims are to **Educate**, to **Protect and** to **Support**. We will do this by:

- Educating our staff and volunteers in understanding the issues and signs of Radicalisation, Extremism and Gang Culture
- Empower all to recognise the signs of vulnerability within the individual that makes them vulnerable to Radicalisation, Extremism and Gang Culture.
- Support individual in moving away from the dangers of Radicalisation, Extremism and Gang Culture by making referrals to appropriate agencies
- Safeguard and report where necessary concerns around Radicalisation , Extremism and Gang Culture .
- Ensure referrals are made to specialised support for individuals affected by Radicalisation, Extremism and Gang Culture concerns where necessary.

Definitions

All information and definitions below are taken from the UK Government Prevent Duty Guidance for England and Wales issued 12 March 2015 and revised on 16 July 2015.

Radicalisation

The process by which a person comes to support terrorism and extremist ideologies associated with terrorist groups

Extremism

The vocal or active opposition to fundamental British values including democracy, the rule of law, individual liberty and mutual respect and tolerance of different faiths and beliefs. Extremism also includes calls for death of members of the armed forces (revised July 2015 Paragraph 7)

Terrorism

The use or threat of action (both in and outside of the UK) designed to influence any international government organisation or to intimidate the public and is for the purpose of advancing a political, religious, racial or ideological case.

Gangs and Gang Culture

The definition of a gang is a group of people with a shared interest, or who share a common identity. A gang does not have to be involved in criminal activity, although when we hear the word 'gang' that is what we tend to think of.

It isn't illegal to be a member of a gang, although many young people will become involved in crime through their allegiance to a gang. Many gangs involve themselves in drugs, violence and weapons.

Violence is a way for gang members to gain recognition and respect by asserting their power and authority on the streets, with a large proportion of street crime perpetrated against members of other gangs or the relatives of gang members. A person involved with a gang can potentially be both a victim and a perpetrator.

Many people get involved with gangs for the following reasons:

- Protection
- Power
- Links with friends or family
- To make money
- Boredom
- Gain respect or recognition
- To belong
- Seem glamourous to others
- Not enough support to stop involvement
- Coerced

<u>Procedure</u>Any suspected concerns around the subject matters of this document should be discussed firstly with your Line Manager and Safeguarding Departmental Representative (SDR). They will then help guide you through the next steps of reporting, while the SDR will engage support from specialised agencies such as Safeguarding Boards, and Police where necessary.

N.B Where clients are concerned under B.A.C.P code of ethics and Life Terms of Service we have a statutory obligation to report under:

- The Terrorism Act 2000, s.38B any suspected act or involvement with terrorism
- The Drug Trafficking Act 1994 and Crime Act 2002 any supply or trafficking of drugs
- Money Laundering Regulations 2007 money laundering from the gains of the point 1 & 2 In an emergency for example where there is information that a violent act is imminent or threat of danger to the public The Terrorism Hotline must be called 0800 789321.

Staff and volunteers must be alert to the fact that the subject matters of this procedure may have in some instances a wider reach. For example, we may be made aware of information via a Third Party where a child or adult at risk of harm may be compromised by involvement or neglect. Under our Third Party Statement we have a duty to report to relevant agencies where necessary.

Whistle blowing - we encourage staff and volunteers to make use of our internal system to Whistle blow or raise any issue in confidence. Please refer to Life's Whistle Blowing Policy.
